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Rabbi's Message

MAY WE FORGIVE WITHOUT AN APOLOGY?

Judge all men with the scale weighted in his favor - Mishnah Avot

Maimonides, in his Laws of Repentance, teaches that it is mandatory for Jews to confess to G-d any transgression of Torah law we may make, and to ask G-d for forgiveness. And, because we are in a covenant with G-d, when we have fulfilled our part of the agreement by showing true *t*'shuvah -- literally, returning, often translated as repentance -- G-d is obligated, in return, to forgive us!

But Jews are not required, or even permitted, simply to forgive our fellow human beings without their having received the beneficial though difficult experience of offering a sincere apology, including the promise of changed behavior.

When members of Mother Emanuel AME church in Charlottesville very publicly forgave the murderer of nine of their worshippers, including the church's Pastor, during study and prayer, though the killer had not apologized, expressed remorse or shown evidence of transformation, we knew that this was not a customary Jewish way of forgiveness. But is there a place in Judaism for forgiveness when no apology is offered?

Forgiveness is a powerful way of each person's recognizing the humanity of the other. We all do bad things, and each of us may even be capable of doing the very thing that has hurt us. Unlike G-d, we may not be able to wipe the slate clean; *m'chilah*, a legal term for forgiveness, comes from the world of finance. It means that though we may forgive a debt, that debt still remains outstanding.

Jewish law does not expect us to forget someone's bad behavior toward us. Forgiving does not excuse it or make it right somehow. The bad action has hurt us, taken something from us. Apologizing is a difficult action that, in turn, takes something from the one who apologizes.

But sometimes the other person is not able to apologize. So, what do we do with our feelings of hurt right now? We can understand that the humanity of the other person may include just not being ready yet to make that major leap into a full apology. Like us, they may be hurting, whether from some actions of our own that made them feel injured, or from some other cause.

In the meantime, we can open the door to reconciliation, by thinking positive thoughts about the person who has hurt us. We can see them as a human being, rather than a monster, and wish them well. In what we might call a kind of "Charlottesville forgiveness," this act of unconditional love can give us peace.

It is my wish for every one of you, the members and friends of our spiritual family at Congregation Beth Sholom, that you find the peace, the deep fulfillment and the joy of a safe, healthy and sweet High Holiday season: a *shanah tovah u'm'tukah*, with love and blessings – Rabbi Karen Allen – 386.254.2773.

Once again, a heartfelt thank you to Rabbi Karen Allen and her musical partner Mr. Zoriy Zinger for creating a wonderful musical evening. I know that they worked hard to record the music so that we could offer this service which is a highlight of our year. I hope that everyone who joined in enjoyed the service as much as I did.

Our synagogue has a long and wonderful history. For more than 65 years services have been held in our building, which we own. Therefore, there is no building fund.

We have a very special spiritual leader in Rabbi Karen Allen. Not only does she have a magnificent voice, but she has a caring heart, and is always available to any person who needs her assistance. Rabbi Allen not only leads our High Holiday and Shabbat Services, she also conducts a monthly Roundtable Discussion Group, and inspires us with her articles in the Shofar. The rabbi has started doing the Roundtable by Zoom as well, as the library where meetings are normally held is still closed. But, the advantage is that people who might not normally attend (due to distance, etc) are now able to join the conversation.

As a congregation we celebrate Sukkot, Chanukah, Tu B'Shevat, Purim and Passover, often sharing a meal or snack together as we enjoy the customs of each holiday. We are looking forward to the future when we can safely return to the shul to continue worship with our CBS family.

We are *"The Synagogue That Feels Like Family"*. We know each other. We care about one another. We love spending time together at our wonderful shul. I would like to thank Dee Marcus and members of Sisterhood as well as Ben Solotoroff (President of the Men's Club) who have reached out to our members to make sure that everyone is well.

Our holiday services will be virtual. We will start them early so that we can have our social time before the actual service begins. It's probably a good idea to login early to be sure you don't miss the start of the service. Having the services on Zoom will permit us to welcome all guests who wish to attend. As always, guest donations are appreciated. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me.

If you are visiting us for the holidays, I hope you will consider becoming a member. We have so much to offer. If you are already a member, I hope that you will invite your friends to worship with us for the High Holidays so they can feel the warmth that makes Congregation Beth Sholom "*The Synagogue That Feels Like Family.*"
